



that precisely cuts and trims large quantities of paper at one time.



This is not a death threat. It's a metal or wooden block in which steel rule is positioned in the shape of the desired pattern needed to cut the paper



How grossly uncalled for. Unwanted deposits of ink in the non-image area of a printed piece.


